VONROSENBERG HISTORY SKETCH by MRS. HENRY F. HEIN MAY, 1972

Let me take you back to yonder years to the Estate of Eckitten where Peter Carl Johann von Rosenberg and his lovely wife Johanna Dorothea Froelich stood the trials and temptations of those war torn years. Their home life was a happy one and to this union three children were born: 2 sons and one daughter. Carl Wilhelm, Johanna Carolina, and Johannes Carl. Sadness was brought into the family by the untimely death of the mother Johanna Dorothea after just seven years of married bliss. She was 29 years old when she was called to her heavenly home.

Four years after the death of Johanna, Peter Carl Johann married Amanda Fallier. It was during these war torn years of 1848-1849 that our pioneer grandfather came home one evening tired, hungry, and very disgusted with conditions in their homeland. He had often heard of the opportunities and freedom the people in America were enjoying and as he sat evenings with his family around him, he and his wife were dreaming of just such a trip to America. Can't you just hear Peter Carl saying to his wife, "Mein Liebschen, how would you like to make this trip to America"? "Ach no, mein Herr" she replied, "to a strange country and then to travel with all my children, it will take months to make the trip, and how about enough food and water for the long trip? Then coming to a strange country, not knowing the language and customs, do you really think we can ever live through it"? "Ach yah." he replied, "think of our friends that have left Germany and reached America safely--it is our only hope for freedom and this we want above everything else." So after praying and planning and working together in August of 1849 Peter Carl, Amanda, and their eight children-Carl William, Johanna Carolina, Johannes Carl, Carl Eugen, Amanda Karoline, Carl Alexander, Carl August Walter, and Libussa left their beautiful home in Eckitten and their homeland which by now even more unsettled and restless and the war clouds hanging even more heavily than ever. So after careful packing and planning, they were aboard a ship sailing for America.

Needless to say their trip was a very rough one and the landing of the ship was delayed by a severe storm which swept them back into the ocean and endangered their lives for 8 days, then too, all were seasick and very unhappy. But then brighter days were before them.

Finally one December 6, 1849, they landed in Galveston, Texas, tired and worn, but excited about the experiences that were in store for them.

There is an interesting story to the history of Verein owned Nassau plantation which is connected with two prominent and wide spread Texas families, the Von Roeders and the Von Rosenbergs. In 1849, Von Roeder bought Nassau Plantation from the Princes for an unpaid debt of \$18,000. Von Roeder then sold 800 acres and all the dwelling houses to Peter Von Rosenberg, whose wife Amanda tells of the purchase and gives her version of the history of Nassau in her first letter to European friends and relatives. Von Rosenberg was given 23 days to buy some land and when he had returned, he had bought Nassau to his complete satisfaction. So, on they journyed to the quiet pastures and sturdy farm buildings of Nassau Plantation in Fayette County near Round Top, Texas.

Their new home was built on a hill which gradually sloped to the creek with a garden and many peach and fig trees around. The soil was fertile and potatoes, peas, beans, cantaloupes, cucumbers are easy to raise; but it did take quite a long time for the new family to get things in order, and much, so very much hard work. Cattle, sheep, and chickens provided food for the family and horses were a "must." It's quite unassuming owner Peter Carl Von Rosenberg had thriving crops of corn and cotton, milked his Jersey cows and raised his flocks of fine white leghorn chickens. After several years all were well contented and would not change back to the former status for any price. But God has been good to us which we will thankfully acknowledge all our lives. Thus the saying of the first Von Rosenberg family in Texas.

As the children grew up, they left the farm one by one:

1. Carl William married and moved to Austin, Texas.

2. Karolina married a Mr. Hellmuth and moved to Bellview, Texas.

3. Johannes Karl moved to LaGrange, Texas.

4. Karl Eugene moved to Round Top, Texas.
5. Amanda Karolina married a Hungarian officer, H. Von Meerscheidt, and moved to LaGrange. Later the Meerscheidts moved to San Antonio, Texas.

6. Karl August Walter moved to LaGrange, Texas.

And so it is 123 years later, the Von Rosenberg family, living in all parts of Texas, by the suggestion of Walter Otto Wupperman, that the creation of a family association through the establishment of an annual reunion be realized. So on May 7, 1939, Herbert J. Von Rosenberg of the Johannes Carl Branch was elected the first president of the Von Rosenberg Association of "exas. Since that time, the association has worked actively to continue these reunions and also to preserve and expand our store of family history.

In 1949, "The VON ROSENBERG FAMILY OF TEXAS" vol. #1 was published. It was compiled by the Historian, Alma von Rosenberg Tomlinson (who has since died) and her six chairmen who incorporated the family record of the first three generations of the family in Texas. Our goal now is to get out the second edition. Who will volunteer?

To all may I say, isn't this a record to be proud of, and the younger generations are the ones to carry on the good work--so good luck to you and may God bless you to carry on this piece of work.

Farm Nassau is still on the map and also has an Historical Marker on it. It is now owned by a Mrs. Bybee of Houston, Texas.
